Joshua tells the crowd, "Now if you are unwilling to serve the Lord, choose this day whom you will serve, whether the gods your ancestors served in the region beyond the River or the gods of the Amorites in whose land you are living; but as for me and my household, we will serve the Lord." (Joshua 24:15)

Joshua's affirmation of faith will be a theme throughout this fall season. Join us in the months ahead as we seek to discern and make decisions about hearing God's call, and making the decision to follow. We will bring to the light the gods that we serve and why they hold so much power over us, but our focus will be on what it means to make the decision to "serve the Lord."

Be thinking about how you can let go of the gods that cause us to worry and fear. Be thinking about how the Spirit of God has led you through both dark valleys and green pastures. Be thinking about how the Spirit is calling you to decide how to make the decision to serve the Lord with your life.

KICKOFF 2021


August 22, 2021

We are very fortunate to be able to welcome Laura Fabrycky to teach for the Covenant Sunday school class on September 12th. She is author of the new book, *Keys to Bonhoeffer's Haus*. While her husband was stationed at the American Embassy in Berlin, Laura became a guide of the Bonhoeffer-Haus in Berlin and takes readers on a tour of Dietrich Bonhoeffer's home, city, and world. She shares the keys she has discovered there--the many sources of Bonhoeffer's identity, his practices of Scripture meditation and prayer, his willingness to cross boundaries and befriend people all around the world--that have unlocked her understanding of her own life and responsibilities in light of Bonhoeffer's wisdom.

Keys to Bonhoeffer's Haus tells his story in new ways and invites us to think beyond him into our own lives and civic responsibilities. Fabrycky shows readers how to consider what befriending Bonhoeffer might mean for us and the ways we live our lives today. Ultimately, through her transformative tour of Bonhoeffer's Berlin, she inspires readers to discover and embrace responsible forms of civic agency and loving, sacrificial action on behalf of our neighbors.

When I led the Study Tour to Germany in late 2017 (in celebration of the 500th anniversary of Luther's beginning of the Reformation), the morning of our first full day in Berlin we toured the Bonhoeffer-Haus, which was the spiritual highpoint for many of us. While she was not our guide I was delighted to learn that our time there overlapped with hers. Indeed, in our subsequent conversations I have been amazed at the numerous points of contact and am excited for you to meet her. In preparation for the class, I encourage you to read the book.

Adult Study Classes

We Have A Time And A Study for Everyone

We will be offering a wide variety of Disciple classes this fall

Disciple I

The study gives the Old and New Testaments equal time, emphasizing the wholeness of the Bible as a revelation of God. DISCIPLE draws upon the work of scholars, the personal Bible reading and study of the participant, and dynamic group discussion to aid understanding of the Bible.

Disciple II

This study proclaims the transforming power of Scripture while teaching Bible study skills that take participants deeper into the Scripture. The importance of keeping Bible study related to witness is reinforced while participants are encouraged to practice spiritual disciplines arising out of Scripture for the purpose of changing habits and transforming lives. The study also emphasizes the rhythm of coming to God and going for God, of being in the Word and in the world individually and corporately.

Disciple III

We will not be offering a DIII class this fall.

Disciple IV

The study concentrates on Old Testament Writings, the Gospel of John, the Epistles of John, James, Jude, and finally, Revelation. Emphasis on the Psalms as Israel's hymnbook and prayer book leads naturally to an emphasis on worship in the study.

Theologian and Episcopal Priest Barbara Brown Taylor often writes about embodied ministry. In one of her books, she notes that Jesus didn't say "Think this in remembrance of me" at the last supper but instead said "Do this in remembrance of me." These days, it's hard to think. There is so much stimulation and information coming our way. How could we possibly have time to mentally process where Christ has been this past year? I can hardly get through a book, let alone an article or essay; which is why our youth service weeks were so special.

Because of the pandemic, we had to switch gears as a youth ministry and plan an "at home service-trip"

for our junior and senior high students right here in Music City. We picked out places that inspire us: Thistle Farms, Room In The Inn, Open Table, and more. Each day, we piled on the church bus and drove around town visiting these bastions of faith and justice. As we volunteered each day, I saw how there was very little thinking and a lot of doing. We harvested strawberries, pulled debris out of creeks, sorted toiletries, and boxed up food. In short, we spent a week learning to be the hands and feet of Christ.

Every day I would come home and collapse into bed. Trying to be like Jesus is so dang tiring. The

man walked everywhere. He rowed boats and cooked fish. He walked on water and washed feet. No wonder he took a nap on a boat in the midst of a storm! Ministry is taxing.

This is the result of doing life in remembrance of him, not just thinking about him. We used our bodies to emulate a God who came to us, embodied. That work is not easy, but it is gospel.

I got to witness our youth performing labors of love, knowing that they wouldn't always see the fruits of that labor. We put baby clothes in bags with Lena from Strick's Gift. These bags go to newborn babies in need at different hospitals around Nashville. Lena told us that since the inception of Strick's Gift, she has only met one recipient of her labor. Imagine the faith it takes to give our time and energy without seeing the outcome.

Jesus also understood this. He spent three decades preaching and healing while some denied him, ignored him or betrayed him. He ascended before he saw the outcome of his good works. Yet, he did it anyway. He loved anyway.

Our hope during these service weeks was to remind our youth that it is in the doing that we remember Christ. Sure, it is important to think and talk about God's word on Sundays or in small groups, but it is also our responsibility to step into his shoes and follow after him to the places he went: places in need.

I want to leave you with a quote by the mystic Teresa of Avila. I read this to our youth each morning before we hopped on the bus:

"Christ has no body now but yours. No hands, no feet on earth but yours. Yours are the eyes through which he looks compassion on this world. Yours are the feet with which he walks to do good. Yours are the hands through which he blesses all the world. Yours are the hands, yours are the feet, yours are the eyes, you are his body. Christ has no body now on earth but yours."





We have also participated in Saturday learning/tutoring/fun activities to help with areas where students were challenged in an all-school-year-virtual experience and begun a planning process with our United4Hope Leadership Team: Jennifer Anderson, Ann Schulze, Beth Drake, June Fortson, Kelly Christie, Rebecca Spencer, and Jackie Shrago.

Plans for the fall include:

Furnishing and volunteer staffing a Community Room: emergency food supplies, diapers, but also partnering with families for various needs, including some pro-bono legal assistance, health insurance, technology support, college readiness activities with students and parents—including completing college applications, requesting financial aid. This is a beginning and can grow as we all learn together how to partner with a new set of neighbors.

Regular weekly tutoring with students identified by teachers.

Encouraging teachers who have made it through a very tough COVID year, helping them feel supported by their community for the 2021-22 school year.

Possibly using some of our Joy in Learning activities with families, especially with parents whose English is limited.



Continuing A Relationship with Cockrill Elementary

Westminster has had a supportive relationship with Cockrill Elementary for many years. In prior years, several of our members tutored youngsters. Westminster folks will continue their involvement in the following areas:

- Reading Partners meet weekly with students to encourage and support reading (expected start date: September).
- Assisting teachers by proctoring classes during school TCAP testing.
- We also provide important in-kind donations and plan to continue that in 2021-22 with Jennifer Anderson coordinating our efforts.

We will be collecting standard school attire throughout the school year which includes:

The Food Bank At Nueva Vida Church

On May 29, seven of us from Westminster volunteered at the food bank at the Iglesias Presbiteriana Nueva Vida-the New Life Presbyterian Church—the church that shares space with the Glencliff Presbyterian Church. I want to tell you about the Food Bank before I tell you about our day.

The food bank is part of the Matthew 25 Food Program of the Presbytery of Middle Tennessee. It began in early 2021 and partners with the Nourish Food Bank and the Kharis Foundation, as well as Nueva Vida and Glencliff. Food is provided through the USDA commodity program. Non-edible grocery items like diapers, hygiene products, and baby food are provided by donations and are not always available. The food bank reaches out to families and individuals who are having financial or food insecurity problems. Food is distributed on Tuesday and Saturday afternoons.

Now that you know a little about the food bank, I'll tell you about our day. The food bank is housed in

the white addition at the back of the church. We registered with the volunteer coordinator, were given a tour, and learned what our jobs would be. Three of us worked in the room with refrigerators and freezers for meat, poultry, dairy, juice, anything that needs to be kept cold/frozen. Three more were in another room with shelves of canned foods and pantry staples like flour, corn meal, and sugar (also in that room is toilet paper and other non-food items if any have been donated). Three grocery carts are in the hall. After an application is completed, a cart is given a number and the two/ three volunteers for each room are given a clip board with a list of everything needed to complete the order. Items go in boxes, to the cart, to the hallway to meet up with items from the cold food room. Another volunteer helps the family get the groceries to their car.

The food bank was not as busy as usual. In our down time, we checked use-by dates on containers

and regrouped items, so they were easier to find. New supplies come in on Tuesdays and Thursdays and the food bank organization is amazing.

At the end of the day, we talked a bit about how our day went. We all agreed that the food bank will help many families and individuals, and we appreciate that Westminster has another way to be part of Matthew 25. This is an opportunity to help feed our neighbors...to do some good.

Westminster has agreed to provide volunteers every third Saturday from 11:30 AM until 3:30 PM. You can get information on how to sign up from Bob Sewell or by calling him at 615-351-1199. Volunteering was a great experience; one I plan to repeat soon.
