About the Prelude

The Prelude is a musical offering to help move the hearts and minds of the gathering community from the daily struggles of life to the worship of God. Today's prelude, originally written for piano, was also arranged for orchestra. It opens with a simple Chorale, followed by a repetitive chant. After many repetitions the Chorale and chant are combined.

In Christ's love there is no East, no West, no North, no South,


but only one Spirit of hope, love, and peace for all!

About Hymn 20

One of a series of hymns the author wrote for children on the Apostles' Creed, this text (originally in seven stanzas) expands "Maker of heaven and earth." The first stanza became the refrain when the test was later set to a popular tune from the age of King Charles II. TEXT: Cecil Frances Alexander, 1848; MUSIC: English melody, 17th cent.

Call to Confession

A call to confession expresses God's initiative in calling for repentance and promising forgiveness in Christ. As members of Christ's body, we confess the reality of sin, captivity, and brokenness in personal and common life and ask for God's saving grace.

About the Kyrie

The Kyrie (Greek "kyrios" [Lord]) is a corporate musical prayer for grace.

Assurance of Pardon

A declaration of forgiveness proclaims the good news of God's mercy and offers the assurance of pardon in Jesus' name. The liturgist pours water into the font, which reminds us of the grace and cleansing of our Baptism, and the baptismal call to



About the Postlude

The Postlude is considered the final Alleluia of worship. Today's Postlude is a fugue, and is dedicated to Henri Doven, organist at the Soissons Cathedral. The descending eightnote carillon theme is inverted and augmented, culminating with stretto, toccatalike texture, and crashing chords.



About Hymn 516
