About the Prelude

The Prelude is a musical offering to help move the hearts and minds of the gathering community from the daily struggles of life to the worship of God. Today's preludes are based on the great reformation hymn A Mighty Fortress. (Walcha (d. 1991) was a blind German organist, harpsichordist, and composer who specialized in the works of Baroque masters, such as Bach. Rebecca Te Velde (b. 1956) is a third-generation professional organist who currently teaches at Oklahoma State University.



About Hymn 275

Long before Isaac Watts began to Christianize the Psalms, Martin Luther had already done so when he created the text and tune for this, his most famous hymn, which is based on Psalm 46. Luther encouraged metrical versions of psalms as well as chanted psalms and new hymns. TEXT and MUSIC: Martin Luther, 1529.

Prayer of Confession

Having praised the holiness of God, we must also face the errant state of the world and of our lives, confessing our unworthiness to enter into God's presence. Nevertheless, we approach God with confidence, trusting in the mercy of Jesus Christ. This turn from communal praise to corporate confession, established on the promise of God's grace, is one of the hallmarks of the Reformed tradition.

Assurance of Pardon

A declaration of forgiveness proclaims the good news of God's mercy and offers the assurance of pardon in Jesus' name. The liturgist pours water into the font, which reminds us of the grace and cleansing of our Baptism, and the baptismal call to new life in Christ.

PRAYER OF CONFESSION

Holy God, you call us to love you with all our heart, and with all our soul, and with all our mind. Forgive us when selfishness takes up too much of our heart, when worry seems to crowd wonder out of our soul, when fear causes us to close our minds to anything new.


The Act of Praise brings together the choir and congregation to sing God's praise.

Prayer for Illumination


A prayer for illumination calls on the Holy Spirit to empower the reading, understanding, proclaiming, and living of God's word. This sense of utter reliance on the illumination of the Spirit is an important and distinctive mark of the Reformed tradition. The prayer precedes the reading of scripture and preaching of the sermon and applies to all the readings. as well as the proclamation of the Word.

About Psalm 146

This paraphrase of Psalm 146 was a great favorite of John Wesley; it appeared in his first hymn collection in 1737 (published in Charleston, SC) and was on his lips when he died. The 16thcentury tune to which it is set here is the one Watts had in mind for it. TEXT: Isaac Watts, 1719; MUSIC: Attr. Matthäus Greiter, 1525.

About Hymn 203

Considering that this text comes from a part of the world where Christianity is not the primary religion gives these simple but powerful words even more depth and meaning. The tune name recalls the district in the Northern Region of Ghana where this tune was collected. TEXT: Tom Colvin, 1969; MUSIC: Ghanaian folk melody.

The Baptismal Rite

The Apostles' Creed: The oldest surviving baptismal liturgy, dating from around the year 200 C.E., describes the candidate for baptism standing in water and affirming the faith by responding to three questions. Each question corresponds to one person of the Trinity. The Paschal Candle is symbolic of Christ's death and resurrection. The Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world, is our Paschal sacrifice. The Paschal Candle also symbolizes the light of the risen Christ, shining in the world. The use of this symbol dates from the early days of the Church. New Christians were given a lighted candle, symbolic of their having died and been raised to new life in Christ through baptism.

"God is our Refuge and Strength" is a musical setting of Psalm 46 that is appointed for the celebration of Reformation Sunday. This anthem is a favorite of our Laudate Youth Choir. Composer, Allen Pote, is a well-known American church musician who has written prolifically for Christian worship as well as some very popular children's musicals. He is now retired in Pensacola, FL.

In the anthem, "I Give to You...", Scottish church musician and composer, Peter Nardone, has combined his own original music with the ancient chant of the Christian Church, Ubi caritas. Ubi caritas is the chant longassociated with Maundy Thursday foot washing, but it is used frequently in Christian worship throughout the church year. Nardone's anthem combines the chant with Christ's words from the Gospel of John 13:34. The chant sung in Latin by the men of the choir translates as "Where charity and love are, God is there. The love of Christ has gathered us into one. Let us rejoice in Him and be glad. Let us fear and love the living God, and from a sincere heart let us love one another. Christ reminds his disciples of this in the John passage.

Presbyterian Disaster Assistance

Members of Westminster have been generous in providing financial donations for Waverly flood relief. WPC and the Presbytery of Middle Tennessee have dispersed funds to the Waverly Children's Fund and provided gift cards for grocery purchases by hungry families. We have provided interim funding (two months) to Inspiritus for the employment of a volunteer work coordinator, as well as funds for fuel and materials for uses such as debris removal. (Inspiritus, a nonprofit, nondenominational disaster relief organization, coordinates volunteer work in Waverly and Humphreys County.) Funds will also be used to provide financial assistance to homeowners as restoration efforts begin. We will partner with many other organizations in this effort including The Presbytery of Middle Tennessee and other faith groups, the Community Foundation, United Way, and others.

We continue to sponsor work trips to Waverly to provide homeowner assistance. Our next trip is scheduled for November 4 and 5. Our work helps to reduce the cost of home restoration and raises the spirits of local survivors who see the presence of people who care. 
