About the Prelude

The Prelude is a musical offering to help move the hearts and minds of the gathering community from the daily struggles of life to the worship of God. Today's prelude includes a setting of the Advent hymn On Jordan's Bank the Baptist's Cry [hymn] 96] by the Énglish composer Christopher Tambling (1964-2015) and Buxtehude's beautifully simple setting of Savior of the Nations, Come [hymn 102], a 1524 text by Martin Luther.

"Advent" means coming or arrival. The season of Advent begins with an emphasis on final things (eschatology). We watch and pray with expectant hope for the establishment of God's justice and the return of the Prince of Peace. As the weeks of Advent progress, the focus shifts to thanks and praise for the birth of the one who has already come - Jesus Christ our Savior.

The primary symbolism of the Advent candles has to do with light growing in darkness - leading up to the coming of Jesus Christ, the light of the world.

About Hymn 104

Though many Advent hymns address Christ with entreaty and invitation, this more contemplative text considers how an individual prepares for and responds to Christ's coming. It also brings together a recollection of the First Coming with an anticipation of the Second Coming. TEXT: Paul Gerhardt, 1653; MUSIC: Melchoir Teschner, 1614.

Call to and Prayer of Confession

Having praised the holiness of God, we must also face the errant state of the world and of our lives, confessing our unworthiness to enter into God's presence. Nevertheless, we approach God with confidence, trusting in the mercy of Jesus Christ. This turn from communal praise to corporate confession, established on the promise of God's grace, is one of the hallmarks of the Reformed tradition.

About the Kyrie

The Kyrie (Greek "kyrios" [Lord]) is a corporate musical prayer for grace.

Merciful God,



Act of Praise

The Act of Praise brings together the choir and congregation to sing God's praise.

LORD JESUS, COME

SOON! "Lord Jesus, come soon!," which we sing responsively in our worship services during Advent, comes directly from 1 Corinthians 16:22. It is one of the oldest prayers of the Christian Church. It expresses the deepest longing of the Christian – that the Lord will come to us and to our world, bringing the fullness of the peace, joy and healing that God has promised.

About the Canticle

This text is a slightly altered form of an adaption of Isaiah 12:2-6 that appears as a canticle for Morning Prayer in the 1979 Book of Common Prayer of the Episcopal Church. This selection is identified there as The First Song of Isaiah, a title that influenced the tune name. This text is appointed for the third Sunday of Advent, Year C, in the Revised Common Lectionary.

About Hymn 362



About Hymn 482

The Baptismal Rite

The Apostles' Creed: The oldest surviving baptismal liturgy, dating from around the year 200 C.E., describes the candidate for baptism standing in water and affirming the faith by responding to three questions. Each question corresponds to one person of the Trinity. The Paschal Candle is symbolic of Christ's death and resurrection. The Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world, is our Paschal sacrifice. The Paschal Candle also symbolizes the light of the risen Christ, shining in the world. The use of this symbol dates from the early days of the Church. New Christians were given a lighted candle, symbolic of their having died and been raised to new life in Christ through baptism.

Baptismal Anthem (11:00 a.m.)

This text emphasizes the covenantal dimensions of baptism, most obvious in the baptism of children (though also present in the baptism of adults), including the worshipping community's commitment to acquaint children with salvation history and to learn from their humble trust.

The text for this anthem is adapted from Isaiah 40:9-11. Composer Carolyn Jennings is a Professor Emerita of Music at St. Olaf College where she taught for many years. She also served as Music Coordinator and Director of the Senior Choir at St. John's Lutheran Church, Northfield, MN, for over 30 years. Her publications include over a hundred choral compositions and arrangements, a number of text translations and contributions to several hymnals.
