

About the Prelude

The Prelude is a musical offering to help move the hearts and minds of the gathering community from the daily struggles of life to the worship of God. This is the first of Bach's Eight Little Preludes and Fugues for organ. While they were originally attributed to J.S. Bach (1685-1750), it is now believed they were written by his student, Johann Krebs (1713-1780). Nonetheless, they are totally "Bachian" in style.

Baptism of the Lord

At the beginning of his public ministry, Jesus presents himself to John to be baptized in the Jordan. This is a Trinitarian event: as Jesus emerges from the water, the Holy Spirit descends from heaven as a dove, and we hear a voice naming Jesus as God's beloved Son. The Baptism of the Lord foreshadows the season of Lent, as the Gospels tell us that Jesus was driven into the wilderness for forty days after his own baptism. At this festival of the Christian year, we not only remember Jesus' baptism, but also give thanks for the baptism we share with Christ. Therefore, this Sunday is an appropriate time to celebrate the Sacrament of Baptism or for the reaffirmation of the baptismal covenant.

About Hymn 611

This well-known melody was created to provide a choral setting for J.C.F. von Schiller's poem, "An die Freude" (To Joy), as the final movement of the composer's Ninth *Symphony*. The author, a prominent Presbyterian pastor and author, wrote the words with this tune in mind. TEXT: Henry van Dyke, 1907; MUSIC: Ludwig van Beethoven, 1824.

Prayer of Confession

Having praised the holiness of God, we must also face the errant state of the world and of our lives, confessing our unworthiness to enter into God's presence. Nevertheless, we approach God with confidence, trusting in the mercy of Jesus Christ. This turn from communal praise to corporate confession, established on the promise of God's grace, is one of the hallmarks of the Reformed tradition.

Assurance of Pardon

A declaration of forgiveness proclaims the good news of God's mercy and offers the assurance of pardon in Jesus' name. The liturgist pours water into the font, which reminds us of the grace and cleansing of our Baptism, and the baptismal call to new life in Christ.

Act of Praise

The Act of Praise brings together the choir and congregation to sing God's praise.

The Apostles' Creed: The oldest surviving baptismal liturgy, dating from around the year 200 C.E., déscribes the candidate for baptism standing in water and affirming the faith by responding to three questions. Each question corresponds to one person of the Trinity. The Paschal Candle is symbolic of Christ's death and resurrection. The Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world, is our Paschal sacrifice. The Paschal Candle also symbolizes the light of the risen Christ, shining in the world. The use of this symbol dates from the early days of the Church. New Christians were given a lighted candle, symbolic of their having died and been raised to new life in Christ through baptism.

Each of the pieces incorporates original rhetorical melodic elements to adorn and interpret the emotions of the hymn texts and tunes.

A Dialogue Between Two Christian Literary-Theologians: Emily Dickinson and Gerard Manley Hopkins, S.J.

A special discussion led by Victor Judge.

During the nineteenth-century, in America and in England, two individuals courageously enter into bold relationships with the English language and conduct grammatical experiments in verse—experiments that would reveal to them a sphere uncharted by the cartographers, a sphere which the speaker of Emily Dickinson's "Poem 466" names the "house of possibility."

Dickinson and her contemporary, the Jesuit priest-poet Gerard Manley Hopkins, navigate the liminal space between the conventional societal and religious expectations and the selfhood of the poet, and they cross the threshold into a realm quite foreign to 19th-century aesthetics; they become the surveyors of a sphere that would not be named until the 20th century, a sphere we call modernism. These poets, who are not writing for publication become precursors, heralds of modernism, and they will assume, posthumously, their places in the canon of belles lettres. Our objective for this class is to bring Dickinson and Hopkins into a series of aesthetic and theological dialogues on the universal questions that transcend chronology and geography.



THE RIVER

JOHN AUGUST SWANSON was born January 11, 1938 in El Monte, California, and died September 23, 2021, in Los Angeles. He painted in oil, watercolor, acrylic, and mixed media, and was an independent printmaker of limited edition serigraphs, lithographs, etchings, and other prints.

His art reflected his strong heritage of storytelling, inherited from his Mexican mother and Swedish father. John Swanson's narratives are direct and easily understood. He addressed human values, cultural roots, and the quest for self-discovery through visual images. These include Bible stories and celebrations, circuses, concerts, and operas. He optimistically embraced life and spiritual transformation.

As an artist, printer and serigrapher, Swanson oversaw all phases of the production of his original silkscreen prints. His hand-crafted serigraphs are printed in up to 89 colors of transparent and opaque inks, which overlap to create rich and detailed imagery. For each color printed, the artist drew a stencil on Mylar film. Each stencil was subsequently transferred to a silkscreen, which was used to print one color onto the serigraph edition. After many printings, the resulting serigraph is a matrix of richly overlaid colors, visually striking and technically masterful. Beginning in 2011, he began to created editions of archival Giclée print editions. Every print was carefully inspected and color-matched by the artist.

Mr. Swanson's art is represented in the permanent collections of many museums, including: The Smithsonian Institution's National Museums of American History, American Art, and Air and Space; his works are in the print collections of the Art Institute of Chicago, Harvard University's Fogg Museum, the Tate Gallery, the Victoria and Albert Museum in London. His painting, THE PROCESSION, is displayed in the Vatican Museums' Collection of Modern Religious Art.
