

About the Prelude

The Prelude is a musical offering to help move the hearts and minds of the gathering community from the daily struggles of life to the worship of God. Published in 1845, this sonata explores both C minor and C major. The slow movement, with its lovely but somber running eighth notes in minor mode, leads into a more spirited movement that has a processional feel. Both sensibilities are welcome aspects of our worship.

About Hymn 366

This text and this tune occur in almost all English-language hymnals (though not always together). The transforming power of love motivates the unending praise of the life to come, and this fine Welsh tune (whose name means "delightful") gives us a foretaste of endless song. TEXT: Charlie Wesley, 1747; MUSIC: Rowland Hugh Prichard, 1831.

Prayer of Confession

Having praised the holiness of God, we must also face the errant state of the world and of our lives, confessing our unworthiness to enter into God's presence. Nevertheless, we approach God with confidence, trusting in the mercy of Jesus Christ. This turn from communal praise to corporate confession, established on the promise of God's grace, is one of the hallmarks of the Reformed tradition.

Assurance of Pardon

A declaration of forgiveness proclaims the good news of God's mercy and offers the assurance of pardon in Jesus' name. The liturgist pours water into the font, which reminds us of the grace and cleansing of our Baptism, and the baptismal call to new life in Christ.

Act of Praise

The Act of Praise brings together the choir and congregation to sing God's praise.

Help us to remember, O Lord, for we seem to practice forgetting.

We forget who made us and why, we forget your daily grace and unremitting love, we forget your forgiveness of ourselves and our neighbors.

The poem "Day by Day" is known by most of us because of its inclusion in Stephen Schwartz' Broadway musical, Godspell. But you may not know that the poem was written by Richard de Wych (1197-1253), Bishop of Chichester, England, and then canonized in 1262 as Saint of the Roman Catholic Church. The musical setting of this ancient text sung today is by British composer, Martin How (b. 1931). How specialized in the training and motivation of young singers at the Royal School of Church Music in Salisbury, Wiltshire,

Ubi caritas is a Gregorian chant text long-associated with the celebration of communion. It was written at the end of the 8th century. The words and ancient chant melody have served as the basis for several important choral anthem settings written in the 20^{th} & 21^{st} centuries-especially the setting by Maurice Durufle composed in 1960. We sing the Durufle setting annually, at least, but today's setting is by contemporary Norwegian composer, Ola Gjeilo (pronounced yaylow). Gjeilo (b. 1978) states that the Durufle was what inspired his composition. While Durufle used the Gregorian chant melody, Gjeilo states that "I used chant as more of a general inspiration, while also echoing the form and dynamic range of Durufle's iconic setting."
