

About the Prelude

The Prelude is a musical offering to help move the hearts and minds of the gathering community from the daily struggles of life to the worship of God. Given a new rhythmic treatment and dressed in a more contemporary harmonic vocabulary the beloved tune ODE TO JOY is still joyfully discernible in Langlois' composition. She is a church musician, composer, and organ professor in MN. We sing the tune during Eastertide with the words, "Christ is risen, shout hosanna" and more generally as "Joyful, joyful, we adore Thee.

About Hymn 321

This hymn was one of twelve written by an English curate to affirm the articles of the Apostles' Creed with biblical allusions such as 1 Corinthians 3:11 here. Though not created for this text, the tune was joined to it in 1868, and the two have been inseparable ever since. TEXT: Samuel John Stone, 1866; MUSIC: Samuel Sebastian Wesley, 1864.

Prayer of Confession

Having praised the holiness of God, we must also face the errant state of the world and of our lives, confessing our unworthiness to enter into God's presence. Nevertheless, we approach God with confidence, trusting in the mercy of Jesus Christ. This turn from communal praise to corporate confession, established on the promise of God's grace, is one of the hallmarks of the Reformed tradition.

Assurance of Pardon

A declaration of forgiveness proclaims the good news of God's mercy and offers the assurance of pardon in Jesus' name. The liturgist pours water into the font, which reminds us of the grace and cleansing of our Baptism, and the baptismal call to new life in Christ.

Act of Praise

The Act of Praise brings together the choir and congregation to sing God's praise.

About Psalm 97, Hymn 365

The theme of rejoicing that unites Psalm 97 is fittingly emphasized here by the refrain that ties together these four stanzas. Instead of the intimacy with God celebrated in other psalms, the primary concern here is to proclaim God's power of all false gods that tempt us. TEXT: Michael Morgan, 1995; MUSIC: Arthur Henry Messiter, 1883.

About Hymn 346

The first line of this text quotes the declared purpose of the leaves of the tree of life growing beside the river of life in the heavenly Jerusalem (Revelation 22:2). The hymn continues by identifying some of the many ways we are called to share with God in this healing work. TEXT: Fred Kaan, 1965; MUSIC: John Francis Wade, c. 1750.

*Profession of Faith

Through baptism we enter the covenant...

With the whole Church, let us confess our faith.

Do you believe in God, the Father almighty?

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

Do you believe in Jesus Christ?

I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead.

On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven; he is seated at the right hand of the Father; and he will come to judge the living and the dead.

Do you believe in the Holy Spirit?

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

The Baptismal Rite

The Apostles' Creed: The oldest surviving baptismal liturgy, dating from around the year 200 C.E., describes the candidate for baptism standing in water and affirming the faith by responding to three questions. Each question corresponds to one person of the Trinity. The Paschal Candle is symbolic of Christ's death and resurrection. The Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world, is our Paschal sacrifice. The Paschal Candle also symbolizes the light of the risen Christ, shining in the world. The use of this symbol dates from the early days of the Church. New Christians were given a lighted candle, symbolic of their having died and been raised to new life in Christ through baptism.

This text on Luke 4:16-20, the author's first, was written for the United Presbyterian Women's National Meeting in July 1976 because the team planning worship could not find a suitable hymn on that passage. She wrote the words with this vigorous 18thcentury tune in mind. TEXT: Jane Parker Huber, 1976; MUSIC: Musica Sacra, c. 1778.

About the Postlude

The Postlude is considered the final Alleluia of worship. The South German Baroque composer Pachelbel was a generation before Bach; he experimented with a variety of forms of compositions, and was a prolific composer of music for the church. "Toccata" means "touch piece" and is marked by rapid, virtuosic passages. Let us go out on this last Sunday of Eastertide with the joy embodied in his writing.

Let's Build A House Waverly Work Weekend June 16-18

Greetings to everyone. Progress is being made in Waverly! New homes are being built for flood survivors! We have helped demolish many homes over the past year and now have the opportunity to help rebuild one!

Westminster is working with the Appalachian Service Project (ASP) to construct a 864 square foot home for an elderly couple who lost their home in the floods. This project will be very similar to a Habitat for Humanity home. The frame will be up and we will install vinyl siding, soffits, facia, build two porches and install interior insulation. We are blessed to have Steve Lainhart (siding), Mike Renwick (porches) and Kelly Christie and Nan Holland (insulation) as team leaders for this project.

We have reserved overnight sleeping quarters at the Waverly Church of Christ for those who choose to stay in Waverly during the three day period. There are male and female sleeping quarters and plenty of showers in both. If anyone wishes to commute that's OK, but work begins at 8:00 AM. To ensure we complete the tasks assigned, I encourage volunteers to commit for all three days, but if you can't do that, we will take all the time you can provide. The CoC will also provide three meals a day for us.
