

About the Prelude

The Prelude is a musical offering to help move the hearts and minds of the gathering community from the daily struggles of life to the worship of God. Organ pipes of reed construction, such as the Cromorne, have slow and irregular onset of tone; while the speech of flute pipes is prompt. This may explain the contrast in notated ornamentation between these suite movements, with no ornaments written for the sluggish Cromorne and a proliferation of ornaments for the agile flutes.

Worship on the Lord's Day

Worship begins as the people gather - greeting one another, praying in silence, or offering music to the glory of God. The act of assembling in Jesus' name bears witness to the Church's identity and mission as Christ's body in the world.

About Hymn 712

This text by a Presbyterian pastor in California expresses the conviction that being a good steward is an essential part of the Christian life, for self-giving is God's own nature. The tune is named for the village in Surrey where the arranger collected this tune in 1903. TEXT: Frank von Christierson, 1960; MUSIC: English folk melody; arr. Ralph Vaughan Williams, 1906.

Call To and Prayer of Confession

Having praised the holiness of God, we must also face the errant state of the world and of our lives, confessing our unworthiness to enter into God's presence. Still, we approach God with confidence, trusting in the mercy of Jesus Christ. This turn from communal praise to corporate confession, established on the promise of God's grace, is one of the hallmarks of the Reformed tradition.

Assurance of Pardon

A declaration of forgiveness proclaims the good news of God's mercy and offers the assurance of pardon in Jesus' name. The liturgist pours water into the font, which reminds us of the grace and cleansing of our Baptism, and the baptismal call to new life in Christ.



About Hymn 250

The writing of this hymn was spurred by a line from the poet T.S. Eliot: "In my end is my beginning. Shortly after this piece was completed, the author/ composer's husband was diagnosed with what proved to be a terminal malignancy, and the original anthem version of this hymn was sung t his funeral. TEXT and MUSIC: Natalie Sleeth, 1986.

The anthems are based on the Gospel reading in the Revised Common Lectionary for today, Luke 16: 19-31, where Jesus tells the parable of Lazarus and the rich man in Hades.

"Didn't My Lord" is a Spiritual that emerged from the context of oppression and slavery in our country; not just one individual's experience, but a systematic oppression that was the living reality of an entire people. The idea that their God the same God who kept Daniel safe in a den of lions, protected three men thrown into an incinerator, and facilitated the safe passage of Jonah in the belly of a huge fish - offers hope and the promise of deliverance to people bound in slavery, is a beautiful and transformational truth on every level.

French composer Gabriel Fauré composed this Requiem in 1887 and it was first performed at the Church of La Madaleine in Paris. We will be offering the complete Requiem for All Saints' Day on Tuesday, November 1, at 7:30 p.m., in the Sanctuary with our choir, organ, soloists, and instruments. Fauré stated that his Requiem is "dominated from beginning to end by a very human feeling of faith in eternal rest.'

About Hymn 766

This text was the winning entry in a hymn-writing competition seeking new texts dealing with poverty and homelessness, but as the stanza sung at the beginning and end of the hymn makes clear, such specific ministries grow out of an understanding of the church as love in action. TEXT: Adam M.L. Tice, 2005; MUSIC: Áfrican American spiritual; Jubilee Songs, 1884; adapt. Harry T. Burleigh, 1940.

About the Postlude

The Postlude is considered the final Alleluia of worship. From a collection of eight "little" preludes and fugues, it is possible that this piece is by a student of Bach, such as Johann Ludwig Krebs. The general language of the pieces is congruent enough with Bach's known works to merit a proximity to him, but certain compositional trademarks point to a divergence from his canon of larger preludes and fugues for the organ.



Special Guest Speaker

The Rev. Dr. Alton B. Pollard III Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary President

October 2

The Rev. Dr. Alton B. Pollard III is Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary's tenth president. He began his service with Louisville Seminary in 2018. A scholar, author, consultant and speaker on the subject of African American and U.S. religion and culture, Pollard was previously dean of the School of Divinity and professor of religion and culture at Howard University in Washington, D.C. Prior to his years at Howard University, Pollard served as director of black church studies and chair of American religious cultures at Emory University, and taught at Wake Forest University and St. Olaf College.

Pollard is the author of Mysticism and Social Change: The Social Witness of Howard Thurman (1992) and a new edition of W.E.B. DuBois's The Negro Church (2011) as well as coauthor of Helpers for a Healing Community: A Pastoral Care Manual for HIV/AIDS (2006). Other volumes he has edited and co-edited include How Long This Road: Race, Religion and the Legacy of C. Eric Lincoln (2003); The Papers of Howard

Washington Thurman Volumes I and II (2009); and The Black Church Studies Reader (2016). He has also written dozens of book chapters, journal articles, and op-eds.

He serves on the Board of Directors for In Trust Center for Theological Schools, and chairs the Louisville Institute Advisory Board, among others. Pollard served on the Board of Commissioners for the Association of Theological Schools from 2010-2016 and was chair from 2014-2016. He is an active member of the Society for the Study of Black Religion and the American Academy of Religion. Pollard earned his doctorate from Duke University, his Master of Divinity degree from Harvard Divinity School, and his Bachelor of Arts degree from Fisk University.

A native of St. Paul, Minnesota, Pollard and his wife Jessica have two adult children and three grandchildren.




