Call to and Prayer of Confession

Having praised the holiness of God, we must also face the errant state of the world and of our lives, confessing our unworthiness to enter into God's presence. Still, we approach God with confidence, trusting in the mercy of Jesus Christ. This turn from communal praise to corporate confession, established on the promise of God's grace, is one of the hallmarks of the Reformed tradition.

Assurance of Pardon

A declaration of forgiveness proclaims the good news of God's mercy and offers the assurance of pardon in Jesus' name. The liturgist pours water into the font, which reminds us of the grace and cleansing of our Baptism, and the baptismal call to new life in Christ.

Act of Praise

The Act of Praise brings together the choir and congregation to sing God's praise.

Scripture

The scriptures bear witness to the word of God, revealed most fully in Jesus Christ, the Word who "became flesh and lived among us." (John 1:14) Where the word is read and proclaimed, Jesus Christ the living Word is present by the power of the Holy Spirit. Therefore, reading, hearing, preaching, and affirming the word are central to Christian worship and essential to the Service for the Lord's Day.

About Psalm 84, Hymn 402

The author of this text, former Westminster Director of Music Ministries Hal H. Hopson, was humming this tune as he began to create a paraphrase of Psalm 84 that would emphasize the beauty and peace of God's house. The tune is named for the composer's oldest sister, who was his first piano teacher. TEXT: Arlo D. Duba, 1984; MUSIC: Hal H. Hopson, 1983.

Vaughan Williams composed this anthem based on Psalm 84 in 1934. The homophonic texture and inclusion of the first verse of "O God our help in ages past" gives it a festive, rousing ending.

The differing voices of this text indicate that its parts were not created together. The stanzas are cast in the voice of a preacher, but the refrain (added later) takes the voice of a penitent heeding that call in language similar to the "prodigal son" (Luke 15:18). The music is an American shapenote hymn from the 1835 collection, Southern Harmony.

About Hymn 269

Not everything that looks like a battle ends up being one. This text, written for a seminary graduation, works well with its martial tune in the first stanza; but later stanzas turn from such imagery and focus on "deeds of love and mercy" and courage for life's journey. TEXT: Ernest W. Shurtleff, 1888; MUSIC: Henry Thomas Smart, c. 1835.

About the Postlude

The Postlude is considered the final Alleluia of worship. Composed in the mid-18th century, C.P.E. Bach's organ sonatas present a departure from the learned contrapuntal organ style of his father toward the Galant. This is heard in the emphasis on melody and the free treatment of texture in which the inexpressive attributes of early keyboard instruments are overcome through the addition and subtraction of voices.




