

About the Prelude

The Prelude is a musical offering to help move the hearts and minds of the gathering community from the daily struggles of life to the worship of God.

Just as Advent begins the liturgical year, the first page of Bach's Orgelbüchlein is the organ chorale on "Savior of the nations, come."

"Wachet auf" is transcribed from one of his Cantata Choruses in which the chorale is layered with a joyful countermelody originally taken by the violins.

"Advent" means coming or arrival. The season of Advent begins with an emphasis on final things (eschatology). We watch and pray with expectant hope for the establishment of God's justice and the return of the Prince of Peace. As the weeks of Advent progress, the focus shifts to thanks and praise for the birth of the one who has already come - Jesus Christ our Savior.

The primary symbolism of the Advent candles has to do with light growing in darkness - leading up to the coming of Jesus Christ, the light of the world.



CALL TO CONFESSION

Friends, the season of Advent is a time of preparation: preparing to welcome Emmanuel to our midst.

Part of that preparation is the honest practice of confessing our sins before God and one another.

Together, let us confess our need for forgiveness.

PRAYER OF CONFESSION

Loving and Merciful God, today we light the candle of hope, a beacon of light that shines in the darkness.

Today, we confess the ways we have caused others to feel hopeless.

Some feel the hopelessness of hunger because of our greed.

Others feel the hopelessness of violence because of our apathy.

Still others feel the hopelessness of racism because of our ignorance.

Forgive us, gracious God.

Be mindful of your mercy, O Lord,
and of your steadfast love,
for they have been from of old.

This we pray in the name of your son, Jesus Christ. Amen.

(Silent confession)

The Cross and Bible lead the procession, symbolic of the centrality in worship of Jesus Christ—the Living Word, and the Bible—the written Word.

About Hymn 367

Despite its familiar Thanksgiving associations, the real concern of this text is to recall the harvest imagery Jesus used to describe the fulfillment of God's sovereignty. The tune name commemorates the royal chapel where the composer was organist for fortyseven years. TEXT: Henry Alford, 1844; MUSIC: George Job Elvey, 1858.

Call to and Prayer of Confession

A call to confession expresses God's initiative in calling for repentance and promising forgiveness in Christ. As members of Christ's body, we confess the reality of sin, captivity, and brokenness in personal and common life and ask for God's saving grace.

About the Kyrie

The Kyrie (Greek "kyrios" [Lord]) is a corporate musical prayer for grace.


Assurance of Pardon

A declaration of forgiveness proclaims the good news of God's mercy and offers the assurance of pardon in Jesus' name. The liturgist pours water into the font, which reminds us of the grace and cleansing of our Baptism, and the baptismal call to new life in Christ.

*AFFIRMATION OF FAITH

We believe that God has come to us; that this God gave us breath and purpose, that we have been blessed to be a blessing to others, that we have fallen short of this commandment but that God has nevertheless loved us despite our brokenness.

LORD JESUS, COME SOON! "Lord Jesus, come soon!," which we sing responsively in our worship services during Advent, comes directly from 1 Corinthians 16:22. It is one of the oldest prayers of the Christian Church, It expresses the deepest longing of the Christian - that the Lord will come to us and to our world. bringing the fullness of the peace, joy and healing that God has promised.

About Psalm 122, Hymn 400

Psalm 122 is among the most joyful of the pilgrimage psalms, because it sings of finally reaching Jerusalem, the home of the Temple. This rejoicing spills over into prayers for peace inspired perhaps by the placename Jerusalem, from roots meaning "to establish peace" (shalom). TEXT and MUSIC: Bernadette Farrell, 1993.

Affirmation of Faith

Responding to the word proclaimed, we affirm our faith in the holy, triune God. The affirmation of faith is drawn from sentences of scripture or the creeds, confessions, and catechisms.





About Hymn 377

The author/ composer of this unrhymed hymn regards it as a meditation and prayer deeply rooted in many scriptures, most connected with the theme of light: Genesis 1:17; Psalm 139:12; Isaiah 60:19; Malachi 4:2; John 14:8; Ephesians 5:8; Hebrews 12:1 -2; John 1:5; Revelation 21:23. TEXT and MUSIC: Kathleen Thomerson, 1966.

The Postlude is considered the final Alleluia of worship. Catherine Winkworth's translation of the first verse of this Advent Chorale reads, "Once he came in blessing, all our ills redressing; came in likeness lowly, Son of God most holy; bore the cross to save us, hope and freedom gave us.
