About the Prelude

The Prelude is a musical offering to help move the hearts and minds of the gathering community from the daily struggles of life to the worship of God. This setting of "O God, you faithful God" by Brahms is from the Op. 122 collection of Organ Chorales, his final compositions. Nearing the end of his life, Brahms turned his focus to sacred hymns, expressed with the contrapuntal voices of the organ.

Today is the first Sunday of the season of Lent. It is a time for growth in faith through prayer, spiritual discipline, and selfexamination in preparation for the commemoration of the dying and rising of the Lord Jesus Christ. Lent begins with Ash Wednesday and concludes at sunset on Holy Saturday, at the start of the Great Vigil of Easter.

About Hymn 226

These evocative stanzas on Christ's Passion come from a twelve-stanza hymn by a 17th-century Hungarian pastor, as translated by the preeminent 20thcentury hymnologist of the Englishspeaking world. The tune name honors the composer's home in the foothills of the Appalachians. TEXT: Pécselyi Király Imre, c. 1641; trans. Erik Routley, 1974; MUSIC: K. Lee Scott, 1976.



The Kyrie (Greek "kyrios" [Lord]) is a corporate musical prayer for grace.

Prayer for Illumination

A Prayer for Illumination calls on the Holy Spirit to empower the reading, understanding, proclaiming, and living of God's word. This sense of utter reliance on the illumination of the Spirit is an important and distinctive mark of the Reformed tradition.

About Psalm 32, Hymn 446

Although this is one of the traditional seven penitential psalms, it could equally well be called a psalm of thanksgiving for forgiveness. It bears witness to the desirability of confession as well as to God's gracious and forgiving nature, encouraging the faithful to seek God. TEXT: The New Metrical Version of the Psalms, 1909; MUSIC: William Lloyd, 1840.

Affirmation of Faith

Responding to the word proclaimed, we affirm our faith in the holy, triune God. The affirmation of faith is drawn from sentences of scripture or the creeds, confessions, and catechisms.



Our Lenten Journey



About Hymn 167

This text, given sharper focus by being reduced from nine stanzas to five, reflects both on Christ's temptation in the wilderness and on the purpose and goal of Lent as preparation for Easter. It pairs well with a 17th-century German chorale setting for Psalm 130. TEXT: George Hunt Smyttan, 1856; MÚSIC: attr. Martin Herbst, 1676 Murray, 2004; MUSIC: Jane Marshall, 2005.

About the Postlude

The Postlude is considered the final Alleluia of worship. This piece is part of the collection of Eight "Little" Preludes and Fugues. They are called "little" or "short" because they take on a smaller scale while fitting stylistically with Bach's other free organ works.

LENT

The word "Lent" is derived from the Old English word *lencten*, meaning "Spring," which in turn derives from the Old High German *lenzin*, referring to "the lengthening of days." The season we know as Spring was originally called Lent. Lent gradually adhered strictly to church practice, and Spring came to designate the season following Winter.

Lent lasts for forty weekdays plus Sundays, a number richly grounded in Biblical tradition. In the Bible there are 120 references to the number forty, among them: the days of Noah's deluge; the days that Moses spent on the mountain; the years Israel wandered in the wilderness; the days of Elijah's journey to the cave of the "still, small voice;" and Jesus' forty-day wilderness sojourn in which he was tempted by Satan.

Lent has traditionally been a time in which Christians have engaged in self-reflection, fasting, prayer, confession and repentance in anticipation of the celebration of the Resurrection of Christ. At Westminster, in order to emphasize the meaning of Lent, we adopt a more penitential posture in worship. There are no flowers; no festive choir processional; no *Act of Praise* following the *Confession and Pardon*; and at several points in the service we incorporate the ancient and plaintive supplication from Psalm 51: "Create in me a clean heart, O God."





REMEMBERING OUR PAST



Rev. W. Murdoch Macleod (1934-1940) grew the congregation membership to 1,174, in spite of constant appeals for the \$100,000 building fund. Young men like Henry Goodpasture and Sam K. Harwell, Jr. led the monumental task of getting money out of a congregation still caught in the bite of the Depression. At that time, West End Methodist was church farthest out West End Avenue; in fact, there was no church in a 15-square mile area lying west of West End Methodist. Moore Memorial decided the "Richland area" was the place for their new church.

By January 1936, the congregation agreed to buy the front yard of the Gray estate at 3900 West End Avenue for \$24,000. The architectural firm of Warfield and Keeble was engaged to design a classic colonial church, with white columns and a tall steeple as the only ornamentation. It proved to be a turning point in Nashville's church style -- no other church of the kind existed here then, and after it dozens of them popped up on the landscape.

Few Moore Memorial members remembered for whom the church was named more than 60 years earlier and the congregation decided to rename the church. After narrowing down many options, the congregation took the final vote on March 7, 1937: 102 for Westminster and 62 for St. John's. One disappointed member said she hoped that the congregation would learn how to spell and pronounce Westminster correctly.

On the cover: Lenten Labyrinth

This painting is visual labyrinth containing many Lenten concepts. The labyrinth begins and ends with the dark path at the bottom —representing Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Some other themes depicted are: covenant relationship, scripture, The Law, discipleship, betrayal, servant hood, readiness, patience, Christ's passion, deliverance, abundance, provision, sacrifice, new life, and love.
