This hymn was one of twelve written by an English curate to affirm the articles of the Apostles' Creed with biblical allusions such as 1 Corinthians 3:11 here. Though not created for this text, the tune was joined to it in 1868, and the two have been inseparable ever since. TEXT: Samuel John Stone, 1866; MUSIC: Samuel Sebastian Wesley, 1864.

Prayer of Confession

Having praised the holiness of God, we must also face the errant state of the world and of our lives, confessing our unworthiness to enter into God's presence. Still, we approach God with confidence, trusting in the mercy of Jesus Christ. This turn from communal praise to corporate confession, established on the promise of God's grace, is one of the hallmarks of the Reformed tradition.

Assurance of Pardon

A declaration of forgiveness proclaims the good news of God's mercy and offers the assurance of pardon in Jesus' name. The liturgist pours water into the font, which reminds us of the grace and cleansing of our Baptism, and the baptismal call to new life in Christ.

Act of Praise

The Act of Praise brings together the choir and congregation to sing God's praise.

Questions to the Parents, Congregation and Children of the Church About Hymn 486

This hymn addressed to a newly-baptized child begins each stanza with a facet of the child's identity, culminating in "child of God." By being directed to one person rather than the whole congregation, this text occupies a special category among the "songs of encouragement." TEXT: Ronald S. Cole-Turner, 1980; MUSIC: V. Earle Copes, 1959.

The Baptismal Rite

The Apostles' Creed: The oldest surviving baptismal liturgy, dating from around the year 200 C.E., describes the candidate for baptism standing in water and affirming the faith by responding to three questions. Each question corresponds to one person of the Trinity. The Paschal Candle is symbolic of Christ's death and resurrection. The Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world, is our Paschal sacrifice. The Paschal Candle also symbolizes the light of the risen Christ, shining in the world. The use of this symbol dates from the early days of the Church. New Christians were given a lighted candle, symbolic of their having died and been raised to new life in Christ through baptism.

*Profession of Faith

Through baptism we enter the covenant...

With the whole Church, let us confess our faith.

Do you believe in God, the Father almighty?

I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

Do you believe in Jesus Christ?

I believe in Jesus Christ, God's only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead.

On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven; he is seated at the right hand of the Father; and he will come to judge the living and the dead.

Do you believe in the Holy Spirit?

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting. Amen.

Seek Ye First

The author and composer of this hymn wrote the first stanza and folkstyle tune while attending a Bible study on Matthew 6:33. The second stanza is based on Matthew 7:7 and emerged anonymously. Choral arranger, Doug Wagner, combines it here with Pachelbel's much-beloved Canon, Such meditative singing of scripture is an important form of sung prayer.

We Shall Walk Through the Valley in Peace

This is an African-American spiritual, which is at least partially inspired by Psalm 23. The author is unknown. It was included in The Story of the Fisk Jubilee Singers; With Their Songs by J.T.B. Marsh, first published in 1880. William Appling (1932-2008) was a renowned American conductor, pianist, educator and arranger. As a conductor he led the William Appling Singers & Orchestra for almost twentyfive years and conducted other choirs and musical organizations, premiering new works by many American composers.



The 17th century church of Sant' Ignazio di Loyola is dedicated to St Ignatius of Loyola (1491-1556), the Spanish soldier turned priest, who was the founder of the Order of Jesus, better known as the Jesuits. The building of Sant' Ignazio di Loyola a Campo Marzio, to give the church its full name, was funded by Cardinal Ludovico Ludovisi (1595-1632).

The church was designed by a group of architects chaired by Orazio Grassi (1583-1654), who was a Jesuit priest, mathematician and astronomer. Work began in 1626, four years after the canonisation (March 12th, 1622) of Ignatius di Loyola by the cardinal's uncle, Pope Gregory XV (r. 1621-23). Both cardinal and pope are interred in the church.

The church was completed in 1685.

The stunning ceiling fresco in the nave is the work of a lay-Jesuit, Andrea Pozzo (1642-1709), who also painted the fake dome. The real dome was never built, on account of a lack of funds.

It is one of the largest frescoed vaults in the world, extending over a length of over forty meters. Inside the fake architectural framework, consisting of colonnades and arches supporting a broken frame that appears of the same height of the nave, the figure of Christ with the cross stands out in the dazzling central empty space.

From him a ray of light stems, hitting St. Ignatius, the closest person to Christ and placed at the top of a pyramid of clouds and angelic figures. Four other light rays radiate from Ignatius, reaching the corners at the base of the fresco, below the false coupled columns, where the personifications of the four continents Europe, Asia, Africa and America are depicted.
