About the Prelude

The Prelude is a musical offering to help move the hearts and minds of the gathering community from the daily struggles of life to the worship of God.

Transfiguration of the Lord

"Transfiguration" refers to a change in form or appearance. At the Transfiguration of the Lord, we celebrate the revelation of divine glory in the human life of Jesus Christ. Jesus' radiant appearance on the mountaintop evokes the consuming fire of the glory of the Lord at Mount Sinai. Standing with Moses and Elijah, Jesus represents the fulfillment of the law and the prophets. The transfiguration looks back to Jesus' incarnation and baptism, as God again claims him as a beloved child.

About Hymn 662

This well-crafted morning hymn opens by celebrating daylight as an image of Christ, the true Light, then ponders life without light, and culminates in a prayer for inward light. The tune's name honors its German roots: Ratisbon is the former English name for Regensburg. TEXT: Charles Wesley, 1740; MUSIC: German folk melody; adapt. Johann Werner, 1815; harm. William Henry Havergal, 1847.

Call to and Prayer of Confession

Having praised the holiness of God, we must also face the errant state of the world and of our lives, confessing our unworthiness to enter into God's presence. Still, we approach God with confidence, trusting in the mercy of Jesus Christ. This turn from communal praise to corporate confession, established on the promise of God's grace, is one of the hallmarks of the Reformed tradition.

Assurance of Pardon

A declaration of forgiveness proclaims the good news of God's mercy and offers the assurance of pardon in Jesus' name. The liturgist pours water into the font, which reminds us of the grace and cleansing of our Baptism, and the baptismal call to new life in Christ.

Act of Praise

The Act of Praise brings together the choir and congregation to sing God's praise in response to the Assurance of Pardon as the last phrase.

About Psalm 50, Hymn 13

This paraphrase, set to a familiar English folk melody, focuses on the opening narrative section of Psalm 50 without attempting to summarize God's speeches in the latter portion of the psalm. Both parts bear witness to God's sovereignty, God's justice, and God's providence. TEXT: Michael Morgan, 1999; MUSIC: English Country Songs, 1893; harm. Ralph Vaughan Williams, 1906.

The Sermon

The sermon, based on the scripture read in worship, proclaims the good news of the risen Lord and presents the gift and calling of the gospel. Through the sermon, we encounter Jesus Christ in God's word, are equipped to follow him more faithfully, and are inspired to proclaim the gospel to others through our words and deeds.

About Hymn 486

This hymn addressed to a newly-baptized child begins each stanza with a facet of the child's identity, culminating in "child of God." By being directed to one person rather than the whole congregation, this text occupies a special category among the "songs of encouragement." TEXT: Ronald S. Cole-Turner, 1980; MUSIC: V. Earle Copes, 1959.

The Baptismal Rite

The Apostles' Creed: The oldest surviving baptismal liturgy, dating from around the year 200 C.E., describes the candidate for baptism standing in water and affirming the faith by responding to three questions. Each question corresponds to one person of the Trinity. The Paschal Candle is symbolic of Christ's death and resurrection. The Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world, is our Paschal sacrifice. The Paschal Candle also symbolizes the light of the risen Christ, shining in the world. The use of this symbol dates from the early days of the Church. New Christians were given a lighted candle, symbolic of their having died and been raised to new life in Christ through baptism.

I Was There to Hear Your Borning Cry

Originally created to accompany a video series on baptism, this hymn speaks in the imagined conversational voice of God, assuring the person being baptized of God's presence throughout the changing stages of life. It offers a reminder that baptism is a once-in-a-lifetime event.

Dazzling as the sun, the face of Jesus on the mountain, like the face of Moses coming down from Sinai ready, strong to lead his people out of bondage into freedom, to the promised land.

Transfigured for disciples' eyes, God's servant who would suffer, as Isaiah prophesied.

Revealed in garments glist'ning white, the glorious Son of Man whom Daniel had foretold.

Then the cloud of presence, then the voice of witness:
"This is my beloved Son on whom my favor rests.

Listen to him." Hear him!

Gazing on the Lord by radiant light transfigured, see the pattern of our lives: cross embraced to Easter splendor. Claim the Gospel vision wondrous: we are God's beloved ones, Claim the transformation promised: destiny of glory!

This is my beloved Son.

Jesus, Take Us to the *Mountain* is yet another Transfiguration hymn written by contemporary American/Slovak Lutheran pastor, Jaroslav Vajda (1919 -2008). Vajda did not write his first hymn until age 49. From that time until his death in 2008 at age 89, he wrote over 200 original and translated hymns that appear worldwide in more than 65 hymnals.

Matthew 17:1-9 is always read on the last Sunday after the Epiphany during Year A of the Revised Common lectionary. In this text that foretaste of Christ's glorification helps to prepare Peter, James, and John for their roles as proclaimers of "God's beloved Son." American church musician and composer, Carl Schalk, composed this hymn anthem for the 50th anniversary of St. Luke Lutheran Church in Silver Spring, MD. He named the tune, SILVER SPRING.

Dazzling as the Sun is a setting of a celebratory text by Delores Dufner, OSB. The text focuses on images related to the Biblical Transfiguration, when Jesus was visited on the mountain by Moses and Elijah and was "transfigured" in blinding light. The text traces the Biblical preparation for the New Testament Transfiguration from the Old Testament and finally relates it to us today.

About Hymn 377

About the Postlude

The title of Cook's piece is accompanied by the text of Psalm 81, verses 1-3: "Sing aloud unto God our strength: make a joyful noise unto the God of Jacob. Take a psalm, and bring hither the timbrel, the pleasant harp with the psaltery. Blow up the trumpet in the new moon, in the time appointed, on our solemn feast day."
