About Advent

About the Prelude

The Prelude is a musical

offering to help move the hearts and minds of the gathering community from the daily

struggles of life to the worship of God.

"Advent" means
"coming" or "arrival." The season of Advent begins with an emphasis on final things (eschatology). We watch and pray with expectant hope for the establishment of God's justice and the return of the Prince of Peace. As the weeks of Advent progress, the focus shifts to thanks and praise for the birth of the one who has already come - Jesus Christ our Savior.

The primary symbolism of the Advent candles has to do with light growing in darkness - leading up to the coming of Jesus Christ, the light of the world.

*PRAYER OF THE DAY

The Lord be with you. And also with you.

Who are we, Lord God, that you should come to us? Yet you have visited your people and redeemed us in your Son.

As we prepare to celebrate his birth, make our hearts leap for joy at the sound of your word, and move us by your Spirit to bless your wonderful works.

We ask this through him whose coming is certain, whose day draws near, your Son, our Lord Jesus Christ, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, forever and ever. Amen.

The Cross and Bible lead the procession, symbolic of the centrality in worship of Jesus Christ—the Living Word, and the Bible—the written Word.

About Hymn 97

This unusual dialogue hymn alternates between the voice of a traveler and that of a watchman, setting up an exchange that creates parallels between the coming of dan and the birth of Christ. The tune is named for a Welsh town whose name means "mouth of the bending river." TEXT: John Bowring, 1825; MUSIC: Joseph Parry, 1876.

Prayer of Confession

As members of Christ's body, we confess the reality of sin, captivity, and brokenness in personal and common life and ask for God's saving grace.

About the Kyrie

The Kyrie (Greek "kyrios" [Lord]) is a corporate musical prayer for grace.

Assurance of Pardon

A declaration of forgiveness proclaims the good news of God's mercy and offers the assurance of pardon in Jesus' name. The liturgist pours water into the font, which reminds us of the grace and cleansing of our Baptism, and the baptismal call to new life in Christ.


Act of Praise

About Hymn 71

This text is a slightly altered form of an adaption of Isaiah 12:2 -6 that appears as a canticle for Morning Prayer in the 1979 Book of Common Prayer of the Episcopal Church. The selection is identified there as The First Song of Isaiah, a title that influenced the tune name. TEXT: The Draft Proposed Book of Common Prayer, 1976, alt.; MUSIC: Jack Noble White, 1976.

About Hymn 86

One of the great virtues of scriptural paraphrases is that they bring fresh understanding and appreciation to familiar passages. This adaption of a customary Advent text, Isaiah 9:2-7, provides an effective example of how revisited verses can take on new life when recast. TEXT: Mary Louise Bringle, 2008; MUSIC: Sally Ann Morris, 2008.




