

About the Requiem

The Requiem (Mass for the Dead or Funeral Mass) has been a part of the Church's liturgy for centuries and there are popular settings by Mozart, Duruflé, Faure, Verdi, and others. Sir Philip Ledger's Requiem is subtitled "a thanksgiving for life" and the Latin texts of the traditional Requiem movements are interspersed with settings of some wonderful poems by the mystical English poet, Thomas Traherne (1636-74). The poems are full of wonder and joy at God's creation and remained unknown until 1896 when they were discovered on a bookstall in London. Sir Philip Ledger was educated at King's College-Cambridge and later returned to serve as Director of Chapel Music and Organist from 1974-82.
